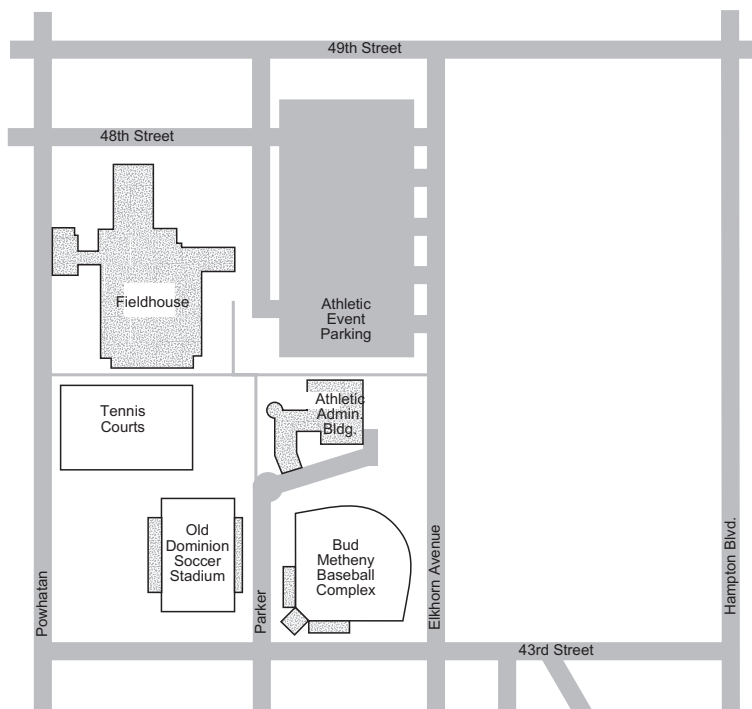
COVERING THE GAME

FINDING YOUR WAY TO THE SOCCER STADIUM...



Directions to the Old Dominion Soccer Stadium: Proceed west off Hampton Blvd. on 43rd Street (this will be a right hand turn if coming from I-564/Terminal Blvd.; a left hand turn if coming from downtown Norfolk). The stadium is on the right immediately past Parker Avenue. Bus parking is available on Parker between the Soccer Stadium and the Bud Metheny Baseball Complex; we recommend fans and media park in the lot on the east side of the Field House (access off Elkhorn Avenue) and take the footpaths to the Stadium. Teams requiring additional information are asked to contact Ken Turner, Asst. A.D. for Event Management, at (757) 683-5924.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only working photographers will be allowed on the playing field during games. Credentials must be secured at least 24 hours in advance of games. Photographers will be asked to wear a photo pass at all times when shooting.

WHY MONARCHS?



Many people have wondered how the Old Dominion University athletic teams came to be officially known as the Monarchs.

For many years, the athletic teams of the Norfolk Division of the College of William & Mary (as Old Dominion was formerly called) were known as the Braves. This was a derivation of the William &

Mary nickname of Indians. As Old Dominion achieved its own four-year status and saw its enrollment surpass that of its Williamsburg neighbor, it was no longer suitable or acceptable to have its teams called the Braves.

The name Monarchs evokes much of the early history of the Commonwealth of Virginia and of Old Dominion's mother institution, the College of William and Mary. The nickname "Old Dominion" was first coined to the Virginia colony by King Charles II after Virginia's loyalty to the crown during the English Civil War. Furthermore, William III and Mary II, whose patronage helped found the College of William and Mary in Virginia in 1693, ruled England at the invitation of Parliament as "joint monarchs."

The Monarch used by Old Dominion has a royal crown on a lion's head, representing an historic past and a strong future. The school's current family of athletic logos were adopted in April of 2002.

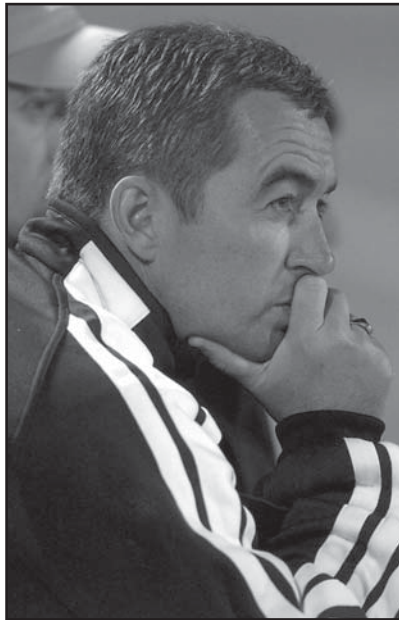

Entering his seventh season, the two-time CAA Coach of the Year, head coach Alan Dawson has guided the Monarchs to national prominence in just a few short years.

Last year, the Monarchs reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. Old Dominion defeated Richmond 3-0 at home in the first round before falling to top seeded Wake Forest 1-0 on the road in the second round. The Monarchs 10-9-1 record last year marks the third season since 1999 in which Dawson has led his team to double digit wins.

In 2001, the Monarchs finished 10-6-2 as CAA semifinalists and captured a slew of post-season awards, including Dawson's second CAA Coach of the Year honor. In 1999 the men's team finished 15-4-0, winning the CAA regular season title and earning him CAA Coach of the Year honors and the Virginia Sports Information Directors' Coach of the Year Award. Entering 2003, Dawson's Monarchs look loaded for another title run.

Dawson, a former assistant coach at the University of North Carolina (1996) and a two-time NCAA Division III South Region Coach of the Year at Methodist, has always been known as a winner. In 1995, he led Methodist to the NCAA Division III Championship game. While at Methodist he guided the school to seven consecutive conference championships and six straight NCAA tournament appearances in only nine seasons. He was inducted into the Methodist College Sports Hall of Fame last

fall.

His combined career record at Methodist was 129-30-1 and his squads finished in the top 10 of the ISAA national polls for seven consecutive seasons. The 1995 team was ranked number one nationally all eight weeks of the regular season as it advanced to the 1995 championship game. He also guided Methodist squads to the round of 16 in 1990 and 1991 and into the quarterfinals in 1992.

Dawson accumulated several coaching awards during his stay at Methodist. He garnered Dixie Conference Coach of the Year honors five times and South Region Coach of the Year honors in 1990 and 1995. He produced 32 All-South selections, seven All-Americans, and two Academic All-Americans during his tenure at the school.

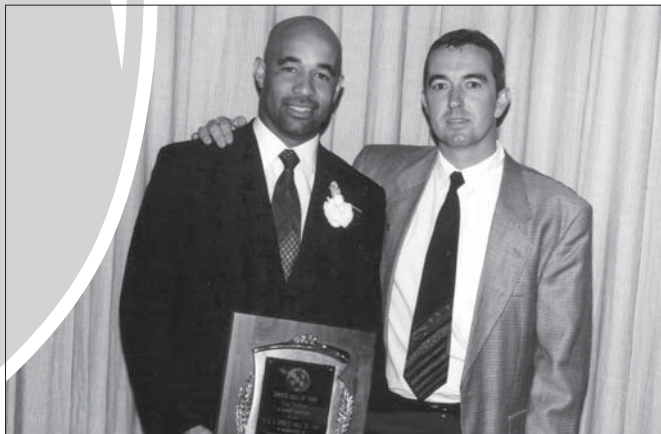
Dawson also coached three teams to undefeated seasons in 1991 (15-0-3), 1992 (14-0-2) and 1993 (17-0-0). He served as head coach of the North Carolina Olympic Development team from 1989-94, winning the USSF Region III championship game in 1993. He was a USSF South Region (III) staff member from 1992 to 1996, and served as the 1979 Region III head coach.

From 1988-91, Dawson served as a member of the NCAA Division III South Region selection committee and is currently a member of the Adidas Scholar-Athlete All-American Committee. He has also served as Chairman of the Intercollegiate Soccer Association South Region rating committee. This year Dawson will be a member of the NCAA Regional Selection Committee for the South-Atlantic Region.

Before coaching at Methodist, he served as a graduate assistant coach at UNC Greensboro from 1984-86. UNCG reached the NCAA Division III quarterfinals in 1984 and won the championship in 1985. Also, he led the Virginia ODP team to back-to-back regional championships as the head coach in 1999 and 2000.

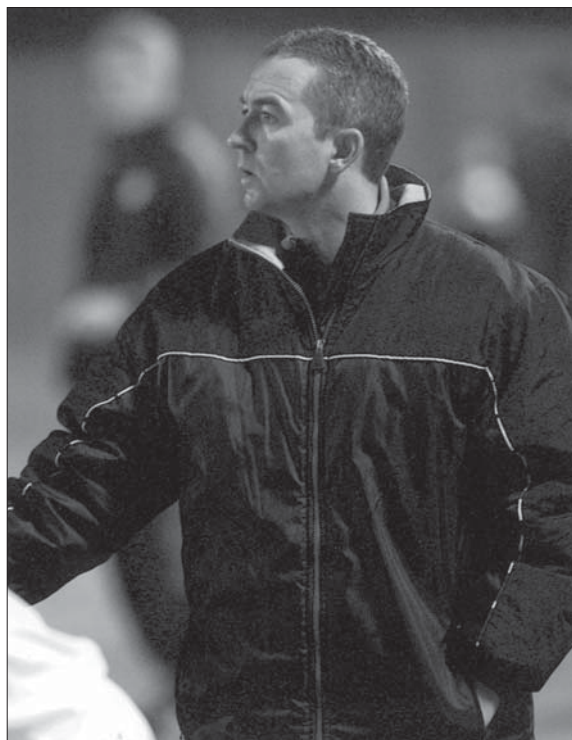
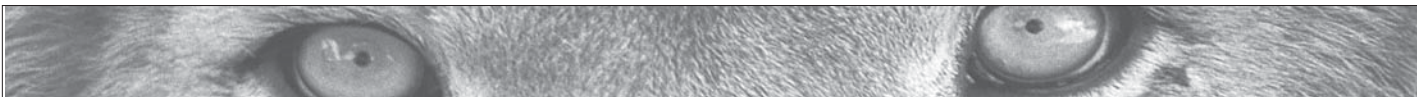
Dawson holds a United States Soccer Federation (USSF) 'B' license, and a Full Irish Badge (Grade One) coaching license. Dawson earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science from Lock Haven University in 1984, and a Master of Science degree in physical education from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1986.

He and his wife Mari have three children, Alec (12), Garrick (11), and Ellesse (9). Alan is the son of Isabel and Stanley Dawson of Belfast, Northern Ireland.

Assistant coach Mark Waite is back for his sixth season with the Monarchs and head coach Alan Dawson. After five seasons of helping Coach Dawson establish a consistently successful program at ODU, Waite, a native of Grimsby, England, has become one of the top assistant coaches in the CAA.

While under the tutelage of Coach Dawson, the Monarchs have never finished under .500, including two CAA regular season titles and last season's best ever NCAA Tournament run.

Prior to ODU, Waite played for the Hampton Roads Mariners of the USISL from 1994-96. In 1996, he joined the Hershey Wildcats of the A-League and went on to be named

the 1998 A-League All-Star Game MVP.

Waite also served as assistant men's soccer coach at Virginia Wesleyan College from 1994-1996 and then at Bloomsburg University from 1996-98.

In 1992, Waite was named a first team All-American and first team Academic All-American at Lock Haven University. He currently stands as the all-time leading scorer in Lock Haven history with 57 goals and holds the single season record of 25 goals. He was also a two-time PSAC Most Valuable Player. He is currently the headcoach of the Beach FC U-16 Super Y League team and holds a USSF 'B' coaching license.

Waite graduated from Lock Haven in 1994 with a bachelor's degree in health sciences and holds a master of arts degree in communications from Bloomsburg University.

Jonathan Jones

Jonathan Jones is set for his third year as an assistant coach at Old Dominion University.

Jones started at ODU as a volunteer assistant in 2001 before becoming a full-time staff member last season.

Jones currently has a "B" license from the United States Soccer Federation and is currently working as a Director of Coaching and Player Development for Norfolk FC, as well as the under-16 boys team for Norfolk FC.

Prior to coming to Old Dominion, the Greensboro, NC native served as an assistant coach

at Watauga High School in Boone, NC from 1998-01. Watauga won three conference Championships during that stretch.

Jones is a graduate of Page High School in Greensboro, NC and played soccer at Radford University before transferring to Appalachian State University. He graduated in May 2001 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration and Marketing. Jones currently resides in Virginia Beach.

This season Victor Reyes will serve as the team manager for Old Dominion men's soccer team. Reyes, a senior at ODU, will assist the coaching staff and players with filming, practice setup and uniform maintenance. The McAllen, TX native also serves on the coaching staff of the Virginia Rush Soccer Club in Virginia Beach and the Churchland High School football and soccer teams. He holds a USSF 'D' coaching license as well as a National Diploma License and a National Youth License through NSCAA. Reyes came to Old Dominion after a six year stint with the United States Navy and is majoring in human resource counseling with a minor in sports management.

2003 Outlook

Monarchs continue Successful Climb to National Prominence

ODU looks to build on a record breaking 2002 season

In 2002, the Old Dominion men's soccer team rewrote the program's record books en route to the best finish in school history. As a team, the Monarchs reached the second round of the NCAA College Cup for the first time ever, earning their first ever NCAA Division I Tournament victory with a 3-0 win over Richmond at home in the first round. Individually, rising senior **Attila Vendegh (Bratislava, Slovakia)** became the most prolific scorer in school history as he broke the record for most career goals and most career points last season. In 2003, the Monarchs will look to continue the momentum from last season in its quest to earn the team's first ever back-to-back trip to the NCAA Tournament.

After facing the toughest schedule in the history of the program, Old Dominion finished the 2002 campaign with a 10-9-1 record, the third time since 1999 that head coach Alan Dawson has led his team to double digit victories. ODU competed against seven nationally ranked teams last season and earned three victories, including two (VCU and Hofstra) in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA). This season the Monarchs boast six returning starters and a recruiting class rated among the nation's best as they again face a challenging schedule.

"We have high expectations this season. We are returning a solid core of players and have some guys coming in that we feel confident will step right in and be successful. The tournament last season was an invaluable experience and now the rest of the country knows we can compete at the highest level," explained Dawson.

FORWARDS

The two-time CAA Player of the Year, **Attila Vendegh**, will once again lead the Monarch offensive charge this season. Vendegh, a three-time Honorable Mention All-American shattered the Monarch records books as he now holds the school record for most goals (46) and most points (108). He led the team last season with 16 goals and seven assists and tallied three game-winning goals.

Working up front with Vendegh will be a talented and experienced group of returners, senior **Michael Goncalves (Alexandria, VA)**, junior **Kyle Hartley (Va. Beach, VA)** and sophomore **Brian Cvilikas (Highlands Ranch, CO)**. Goncalves transferred in last season and was tied for second on the team with seven points, recording two goals and three assists. Hartley fought through a preseason injury to see action in 18 contests, scoring two goals with one assist. Cvilikas stepped up in his rookie season last year to also post two goals, playing in 17 games with five starts.

"We are very excited about who we have in place up front and are confident in what they can produce for us. Attila (Vendegh) has had a terrific attitude heading into his senior season as he pushed himself to a new fitness level in the offseason. He is excited to get on the field and has a great opportunity to show what he can do on a national level. We are also confident in Michael Goncalves and Brian Cvilikas in that we know they have a better understanding of how to play at this level, and Kyle Hartley is as healthy as he has ever been," added Dawson.

Newcomers **Ross MacKenzie (Richmond, VA)**, **Kevin McMenamin (West Springfield, MA)** and **John McClain (Denver, CO)** form a talented and experienced group and will fight to see time all season.

MIDFIELDERS

The Monarch midfield returns an athletic and competitive group and will have several talented rookies looking to make an immediate impact. Junior **Kevon Harris (Kingston, Jamaica)** is back and is ready to be the leader in the middle after an injury-riddled 2002 campaign. In nine starts last year he recorded a team second-best four assists and is set to be an offensive force again this season. Senior co-captain **Ryan Sniegoski (Boxborough, MA)** will also provide leadership in the middle after competing in 14 contests last year with 10 starts.

Junior **Belus Vendegh (Bratislava, Slovakia)** and sophomores **Gianni Cimini (Ontario, Canada)** and **Bamidele Oluwalana (Oslo, Norway)** were important parts of last year's squad and will once again be impact players. Vendegh started all but one game in 2002 and tallied his first career goal while Cimini and Oluwalana played in a combined 32 games with each scoring a goal. Sophomore **Ado Fazlic (Richmond, VA)** will look to build on his experience as a rookie last year to become a larger factor this season.

The midfielder incoming class includes **Gregg Mottinger (Carrollton, TX)**, **Mat Wilkinson (Newcastle, Australia)**, **Walston Ferrell (Fayetteville, NC)** and **Josh Hill (Va. Beach, VA)**. Wilkinson and Hill come to ODU with international playing experience and should provide immediate help in the middle. Mottinger and Ferrell are confident freshmen who will add youth and depth to a quick Monarch midfield.

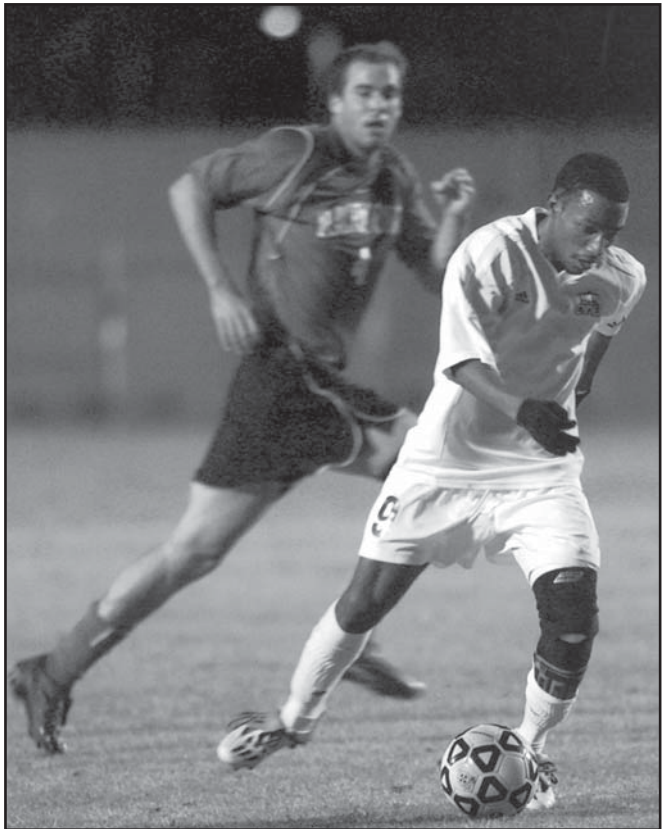
Defenders

McEachron, the 2003 team captain, started all but one game last year on his way to earning All-South Atlantic Region honors. Kaila has started 36 games in his first two years at ODU and helped the Monarchs hold nine opponents to one goal or less last season. Another returning starter in the backfield is junior **Brian Kluckman (Springfield, VA)**. Kluckman is coming off a career year in which he finished second on the team with three goals and made 12 starts.

Redshirt freshman **Kyle Newcomer (Woodbridge, VA)** will help solidify the ODU defense and provide leadership to the incoming freshman. Freshmen **Eric Hoglund (Fairfax, VA)** and **Justin Monroe (Disputanta, VA)** join the Monarchs this season and will push for time as they gain collegiate experience.

GOALKEEPERS

Senior **Sam Cameron (Raleigh, NC)** enjoyed a successful 2003 campaign in which he came into his own as the Monarch leader between the pipes. Cameron started 17 times

and posted a team-best 1.43 goals against average (GAA) with an 80% save percentage. He led the team to four shutouts, including the 3-0 win over Richmond in the NCAA first round matchup.

Redshirt sophomore **John Connelly (Rockville, MD)** earned three starts as a rookie last year and worked hard this past offseason and will compete to see plenty of time in net for the Monarchs this season. Redshirt freshman **Michael Hurley (Freeport, NY)** is ready for his first full season with the team and will also work to see time in goal this year.

Schedule and Outlook

The Monarchs will once again play one of the toughest schedules in the nation. Old Dominion starts off the season playing four top ranked teams in their first six games before competing in one of the deepest conferences in the country.

ODU hosts St. Francis to open the year before traveling to face national powers California and Stanford in the Cal Berkeley Tournament. Stanford has been in the NCAA Soccer Cup Final Four the past two seasons and California is a consistent Top-10 squad. The Old Dominion Stihl Classic is the following weekend and the Monarchs will host regional foes American and Longwood this year. The tournament streak continues when they travel to Williamsburg, VA to take part in the William and Mary Tournament. The Monarchs face Wake Forest in the first game before taking on Marshall. ODU has faced Wake Forest three times in the past two seasons, including the second round of the NCAA Tournament last season. They close out their non-conference slate against UMBC and Campbell and then host UNCW to start the conference schedule. The Monarchs also welcome VCU, an 8th seed in last year's NCAA Soccer Cup, Towson and Delaware to the ODU Soccer Stadium and finish the season at conference rival William and Mary. The 2003 CAA Tournament begins on November 11.

"It is important that we get out to a determined and focused start. We again face a tough beginning to our season but that will only help us better prepare for conference play. We are looking forward to hosting the ODU Stihl Soccer Classic once again this year and feel that it will be a highly competitive and exciting weekend of soccer. Our conference enjoyed a successful year last season with three teams earning NCAA bids. The conference teams are only stronger this season and we will have to play every game hard and take them one at a time," added Dawson.

The 2003 version of the Old Dominion soccer team is prepared for another winning season. The team will be looking to maintain the high level of play from a year ago as they continue to improve and become one of the nation's consistently elite soccer programs.

"We set the bar high last year so we have to go out and reset it even higher this season. We have the deepest and one of the most talented squads I have had here but we have to go out and put it together on the field. Everyone is excited and anxious to get the season started and I believe we are ready to compete at a higher level in 2003," said Dawson.

Norfolk serves as the cultural, financial and business hub of the Hampton Roads Metropolitan Area, which comprises the cities of Norfolk, Portsmouth, Virginia Beach, Chesapeake, Suffolk, Hampton, and Newport News. With a combined population of 1.5 million, the Hampton Roads area is the 27th largest Metropolitan Statistical Area in the U.S. and in 1998 was rated the number one city in the south by Money magazine.

Founded in 1682, Norfolk has been a gateway to Virginia for commerce and industry since the early 17th century.

The city is home to the Norfolk Naval Base, the world's largest naval installation and homeport to the U.S. Navy's Atlantic and Mediterranean fleets; the MacArthur Memorial, the final resting place of famed General Douglas MacArthur; The Chrysler Museum, an art museum showcasing the collection of Walter P. Chrysler, son of the auto company founder; and Norfolk Botanical Garden, host to many celebrations including the International Azalea Festival.

Norfolk's 12,000-seat Harbor Park is home to the Norfolk Tides, the top minor league team in the New York Mets organization.

Waterside marketplace and Town Point Park create a lively waterfront activity center for outdoor concerts, many festivals, and dining with the best sunset views around.

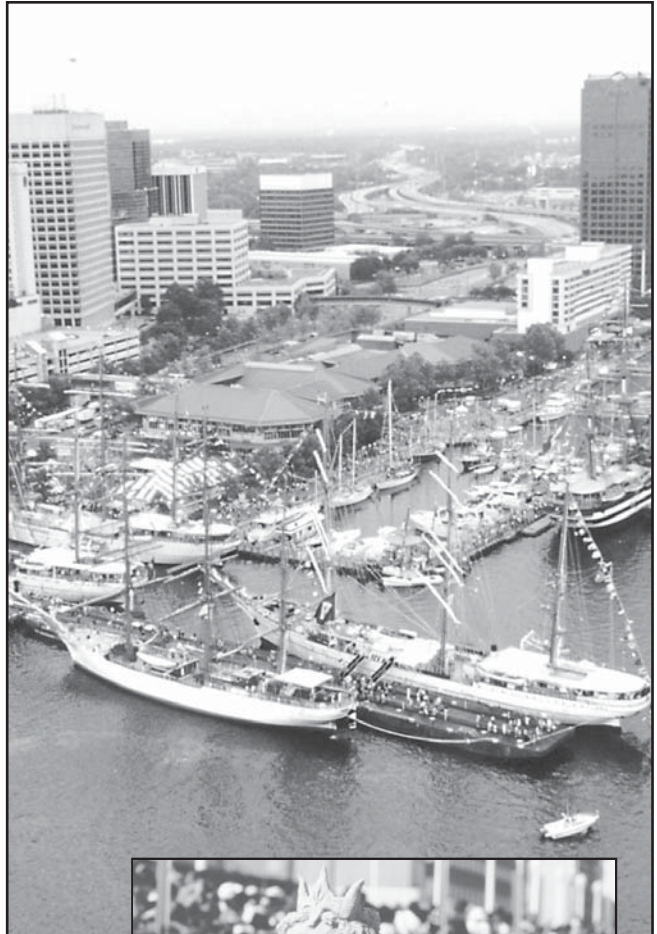
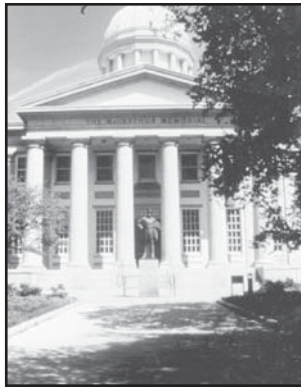

Hampton Roads

Tall ship cruises, harborside shops, the quaint whistle of the Elizabeth River Ferry, the new Nauticus, one of the nation's premier maritime museums and learning centers, and a climate ranked among the nation's most desirable, all make Norfolk an exciting location for university studies.

Just 20 minutes from downtown Norfolk is the oceanfront resort city of Virginia Beach, with its miles of beaches on the Atlantic Ocean and the Chesapeake Bay.

Hampton is home to NASA's Langley research center as well as Langley Air Force Base, while Newport News is the location of the Newport News Shipbuilding Company, manufacturer of the Nimitz-class aircraft carriers.

Just 45 minutes west of Norfolk is the Jamestown-Williamsburg-Yorktown triangle, where, it can be said, the nation was founded, debated its independence, and then won it on the battlefield.

Also within an easy drive are Richmond, the capital of Virginia and former capital of the Confederacy during the Civil War; the North Carolina Outer Banks, including the Wright Brothers Memorial at Kitty Hawk and the Cape Hatteras National Seashore; and the nation's capital in Washington, D.C.

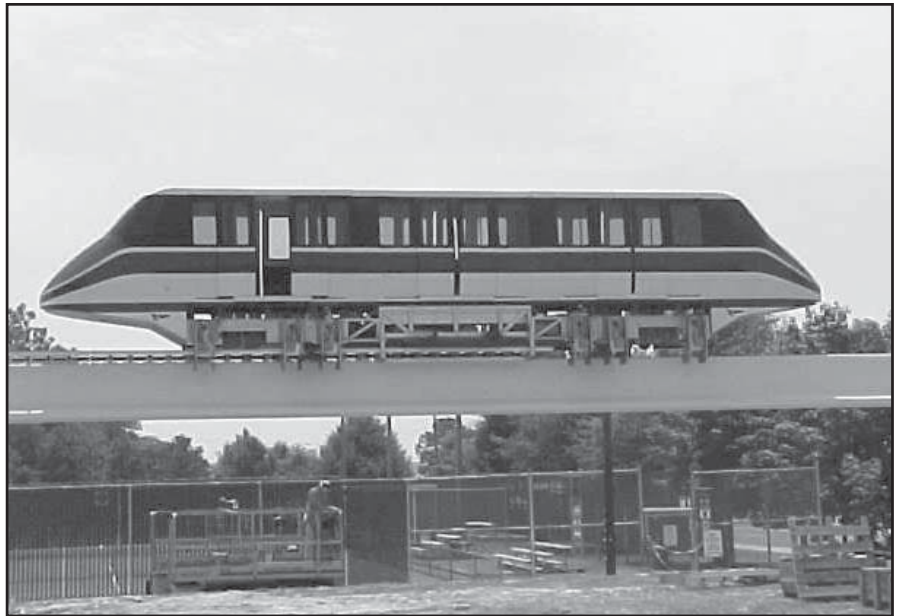
This is Old Dominion

Old Dominion University opened its doors 73 years ago in an abandoned public school building with 206 students as the Norfolk Division of the College of William and Mary, and became an independent institution in 1962. Today, the University enrolls more than 20,000 students, including approximately 6,000 graduate students. Its 188-acre Norfolk campus is the primary hub of activity, along with four additional higher education centers (Virginia Beach Center, Peninsula Center, Tri-Cities Center and Northern Virginia Center).

Old Dominion is a versatile university, committed to its students, their education, personal development and overall success. The University offers 66 bachelor's degrees, 67 master's degrees and 24 doctoral degrees, and consists of six colleges: Arts and Letters, Business and Public Administration, Education, Engineering and Technology, Health Sciences, and Sciences.

Students who live on campus may choose residence hall or apartment-style living. The attractive Webb University Center offers a food court, cyber café, video arcade, lounge areas and other shops to serve the student body.

Old Dominion is one of Virginia's leading Ph.D. research institutions and is a Carnegie Doctoral Research Extensive University, the highest research classification for the nation's higher education institutions. The University contributes approximately \$600 million a year to the Hampton Roads economy and provides the community with a variety of programs and services, including the Bank of America Entrepreneurial Center, Technology Applications Center and Military Career Transition Program. Old Dominion is a leader in space-related research and operates one of the largest wind tunnels in the world at

NASA's Langley Research Center. The University's Coastal Physical Oceanography, Physical Therapy, Nuclear Physics, and Engineering Management and Systems Engineering programs are considered among the best in the country.

Old Dominion's planned renovation of a 75-acre tract of land along the east side of Hampton Boulevard is yet another economic spark for the region. The 8,600-seat Ted Constant Convocation Center, which opened in fall 2002, is the centerpiece of the project. The first set of student residences opened nearby in fall 2003, and will soon be followed

by a variety of shops.

In the classroom, Old Dominion students continue to earn high marks. Former student-athlete and 1996 graduate Samantha Salvia became the University's first Rhodes Scholar, and the University has had three recent USA Today Academic All-Americans.

An international leader in delivering interactive instructional television, the University operates TELETECHNET, a distance learning system that offers students an opportunity to earn one of 20 baccalaureate or eight master's degrees without leaving their area of residence. TELETECHNET is the

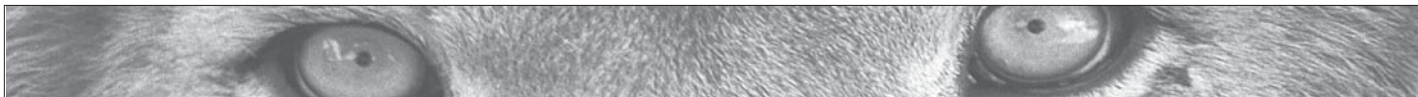
largest televised, interactive distance learning program of its kind in the United States.

Old Dominion is also well known for its international focus in both its curricula and student population. More than 1,200 international students from 100 countries are enrolled at the University. Old Dominion also contributes to the cultural life of Hampton Roads by presenting music and dance concerts, art exhibits, and annual literary and film and video festivals. In addition, the President's Lecture Series brings a variety of nationally known speakers to campus each year.

The University is located about 200 miles south of Washington, D.C., and is but a short drive to Virginia Beach, Williamsburg and the Outer Banks of North Carolina.

Old Dominion Soccer Stadium



We built it, and they came. The Old Dominion University Soccer Stadium has become not only one of the most visited sites on campus, but has claimed its fame as home to some of the biggest, most boisterous crowds in collegiate soccer.

Fans young and old regularly flock to the stadium and its first seven seasons, the stadium has taken its place as one of the top facilities in collegiate soccer.

The spacious facility is located at the corner of 43rd Street and Parker Avenue, directly across the street from the Bud Metheny Baseball Complex, and boasts seating for 4,000 fans. Permanent lighting illuminates action at night, and fans also appreciate the array of refreshments available at the concession booth, located under the west stands, along with restrooms.

Also situated under the west stands are the locker rooms for both the Monarchs and their opponents.

Sitting atop the west stands is a modern, fully-equipped press box, which allows media to view the game, and file their stories immediately afterward. Separate areas for television cameras are also available.

The field itself is Bermuda grass with a sand base, and conforms to both NCAA and international standards.

The scoreboard is located in the south endzone, and is designed specifically for soccer, showing goals, shots and saves, as well as time remaining.

"This is one of the best 'soccer only' facilities in the country," said Head Coach Alan Dawson. "One of the first built specifically for soccer, and still one of the premier facilities in the country, a facility like ours helps us not only as one of the best sites for games and tournaments, but will also enable us to recruit the top student-athletes."

The Old Dominion Soccer Stadium has also served as a site for numerous prestigious events in its short history, including CAA championships and numerous state high school championships. Two summers ago, Old Dominion hosted the Adidas soccer camp, which brought in the best high school soccer players from all over the country. In the summer of 1994, the stadium served as the site of the U.S. U-23 team's 1-0 win over Trinidad and Tobago, which was broadcast back to the Caribbean. In June of 1992, Old Dominion hosted the United States Olympic Soccer team vs. the Bermuda National Team in the final warm up for the U.S. prior to the Olympics in Barcelona. A stadium-record crowd of 3,933 watched the match.

Athletic Facilities

Old Dominion University prides itself on being able to offer the student-athlete the best possible facilities to achieve maximum potential on the field.

The Intercollegiate Athletics Building, opened in 1991, houses both strength training and athletic training facilities which are always at the full disposal of the student-athlete.

The athletic training room ranks as one of the top facilities in the nation, providing the best in modern rehabilitation equipment for athletic injuries. The seven-foot deep running pool, located in the hydrotherapy room, along with three whirlpools and one jacuzzi, provides Old Dominion athletes the opportunity to rehabilitate through exercise in water. The room also includes nine training tables, a Kinkom rehabilitation machine, and a traction table. The athletic training room is under the supervision of Head Athletic Trainer Marty Bradley, M.S., A.T., C., and his two full-time assistants, along with a staff of graduate assistants and student assistants.

Adjacent to the athletic training room is the strength training room, built specifically for student-athlete use. The room includes the most up-to-date in nautilus and free weight equipment, all under the supervision of Strength and Conditioning Coach Andy Zucker.

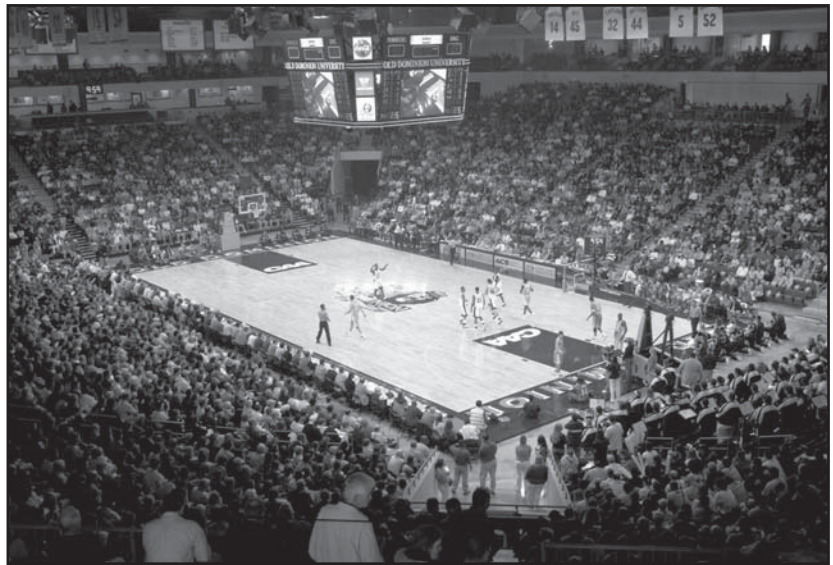
The Intercollegiate Athletics Building also houses the administrative staff including the athletic director, the associate and assistant athletic directors, the offices of sports information, athletic development and promotions, and the ticket office. The Athletic Support Office and Buildings and Grounds offices are also located in the Intercollegiate Athletics Building.

The Intercollegiate Athletics Building is located in the middle of the athletic quadrant of the campus that includes the 4,000 seat Old Dominion Soccer Stadium, the 2,500 seat Bud Metheny Baseball Complex, the 15-court Tennis Complex that includes a 1,000 seat championship court, and the Health & Physical Education Building. The H&PE Building contains the 5,500 seat Old Dominion Fieldhouse, home to the Lady Monarch basketball and Old Dominion wrestling programs, and the J.C. "Scrap" Chandler Pool.

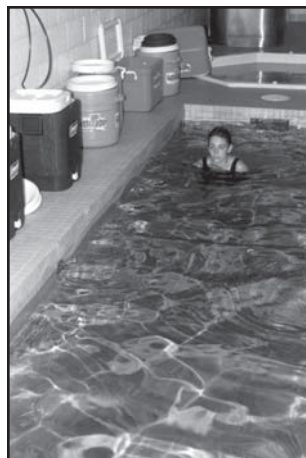
Foreman Field, located behind Rollins Hall on the northern edge of the campus, is home to the field hockey and lacrosse teams, as well as being the site for much of Old Dominion's intramural sports program. The fourth largest stadium in the Commonwealth of Virginia (behind Virginia Tech's Lane Stadium, Virginia's Scott Stadium and Norfolk State's Price Stadium), 20,000 seat Foreman Field regularly hosts local high school and college football games.

The Old Dominion Sailing Center, located on the Elizabeth River on the western side of the campus, was opened in 1985, and serves as home to the Monarch sailing program. Featuring a 200-foot pier and launch area, the Sailing Center also has storage space for the entire Old Dominion fleet of FJ's, Lasers, 420's, and various support craft, locker rooms, classrooms, workshop, and office space for the sailing coaches.

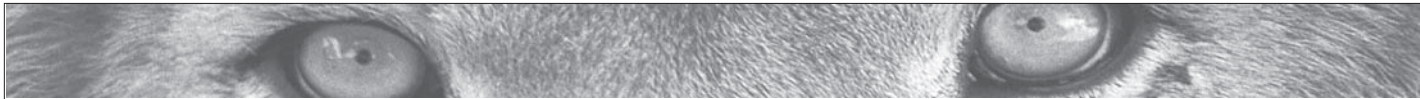
In 2002, the University will open the Ted Constant Convocation Center. The state-of-the-art 8,600 seat building will host all home men's and women's basketball games, graduation, concerts and other University events.

Academic Support

The Old Dominion University Athletic Department offers a wide variety of programs to assist the academic and personal well-being of the student-athlete.

These programs are overseen by Tianna Scott, the academic advisor for student-athletes, and April Brecht, the Life Skills Program director. Their offices are located in Webb Center, within convenient access to all the student-athletes.

Supervised study sessions are required for all freshmen and transfer student-athletes, and organized according to the needs of the individual for upperclassmen. Study sessions meet in a variety of locations across campus, for a minimum of two hours per night, three nights per week.

SAM - STUDENT ATHLETE MENTORS

The Student-Athlete Mentor (SAM) is a peer advising program. SAMs are nominated and elected by their peers. The goal is for each athletic team to have at least one SAM. A SAM on the team can help provide leadership, help teammates with problems, provide support for freshmen, answer questions, and refer teammates to University support services. SAMs are elected on a yearly basis and any upperclassmen may be chosen by their peers to serve as a SAM. All SAMs participate in a training program following elections.

Administration

Dr. Roseann Runte

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT



Dr. Roseann Runte became the seventh president of Old Dominion University in the summer of 2001. Runte, who has 21 years of experience as a professor and academic administrator, became only the third woman to head a four-year college or university in Virginia.

Runte previously served as president of Victoria University in Toronto, principal of Glendon College (York University), president of l'Université Sainte-Anne in Nova Scotia and assistant dean of arts and science at Dalhousie University.

She is an associate to the Council of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, a board member of the National Bank of Canada and a member of the executive committee of the Club of Rome.

Runte has served as president of the Canadian

Commission for UNESCO for two terms, as president of the Humanities Federation of Canada, as a member of the advisory board of the National Library, as founding president of ACFAS-Toronto, as a board member for the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia and of the board of Associated Medical Services, as chair of the board of the Foundation for International Training, and as vice chair of the board of the Gardiner Museum of Ceramic Art.

The author of five volumes of creative writing, she has edited nine books and has written more than 100 articles and book chapters on topics ranging from literature and education to economic and cultural development.

Runte has a Ph.D. in French from the University of Kansas and has received honorary degrees from Acadia University, Memorial University and the universities of Timisoara and Arad in Romania. She received the prix François Coppée from the Académie française as well as the Palmes Académiques and the Order of Merit from the French government, the Order of Canada, the Queen Elizabeth Jubilee medal, and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and of the World Academy of Arts and Sciences.



Dr. Jim Jarrett

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



When Jim Jarrett arrived on the campus of Old Dominion University in the fall of 1967 as a Health and Physical Education professor, he had little idea that his tenure would be counted in decades. During that time span, he has led the program from a well respected NCAA Division II member to a nationally respected Division I power that has captured 25 national championships.

□□□□He began his 33 year as athletic director in 2003, taking over the reigns in 1970 when Bud Metheny stepped down from that position. As one of the youngest athletic directors in the nation at that time, Jarrett quickly began to make a name for himself and ODU. He committed early on to a philosophy of "selective excellence," whereby the department "selected" its competitive sports and committed itself financially, academically and competitively to the sports it felt the University could best excel.

□□□□In 1974, he became the first athletic director in the state of Virginia to award grant-in-aids to women student-athletes. It was a bold move at the time for a young athletic director and equally

young University, but one that paid great dividends. Just five years later, in 1979, the Lady Monarchs won the first of three national championships in women's basketball, and led the nation in attendance.

□□□□Under his leadership, the department's athletic venues have tripled and are considered state of the art facilities. They include the construction of the 2,500-seat Bud Metheny Baseball Complex in 1983, the Sailing Center in 1981, the Outdoor Tennis Complex which has been expanded to 15 lighted courts and a championship court with seating for 1,000-plus, the 4,000-seat ODU Soccer Stadium in 1990, renovations to Foreman Field, which included Astro-Turf and new locker room facilities, and the planning and construction of the 8,500 seat Constant Convocation Center.

□□□□For all his efforts, Jarrett's has been honored many times by national and local groups. Most recently, Jarrett was named the 2003 Southeast Regional Athletic Director of the Year by NACDA. Other awards he's received include the Collegiate Director's Award from the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, and the Norfolk Sports Club Man of the Year. He served as a member of the NCAA Women's Basketball Committee and is a past president of the Colonial Athletic Association and the Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

□□□□An avid golfer and tennis player, Jarrett and his wife Sugie reside in Norfolk.

2002 Review

Old Dominion University Men's Soccer

Heading into the 2002 campaign, Old Dominion head coach Alan Dawson proclaimed, "we have no doubts that we can play with any team in country." That pre-season proclamation turned into reality when the record breaking 2002 version of the Old Dominion Monarchs earned a bid into the NCAA Soccer Cup for only the third time in the program's history.

After completing a 9-7-1 regular season with a 6-2-1 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) record, ODU hosted Drexel in the first round of the CAA Tournament. The Dragons upset the Monarchs 2-1 in double overtime to, what most thought, end their season. However, almost half of their games were played against teams that were voted in the Top 25 at some point throughout the year. The Monarchs won three of those eight games, dropping #12 American, #24 Hofstra and #19 VCU, earning them an at-large birth in the 2002 NCAA College Cup.

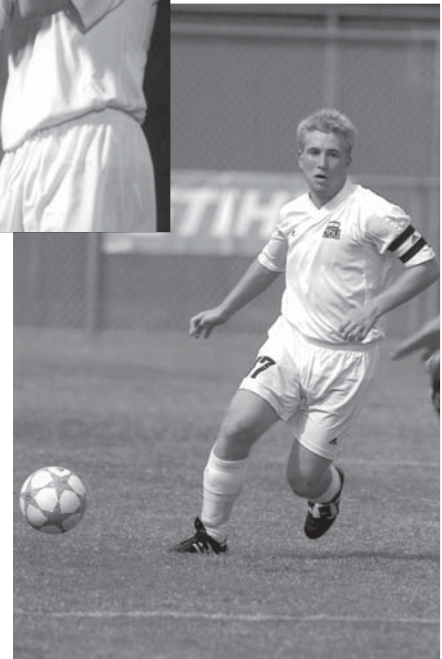
They were awarded with a first round matchup at home against former CAA foe University of Richmond. The Monarchs defeated the Spiders 3-0 for their first NCAA Tournament victory in Division I history. They moved on to visit the top-seeded Wake Forest Demon Deacons in the second round. ODU and Wake went scoreless until the final minutes when the Deacons found the back of the net for the 1-0 victory. With the loss the Monarchs ended the season with a 10-9-1 overall record.

Junior forward Attila Vendegh continued to terrorize opposing defenses in his junior year at Old Dominion en route to solidifying his spot as one of the most decorated players in school history. He scored a career-high 16 goals en route to breaking the all-time school record for most goals with 46. He also had a career-best seven assists and 39 points and broke the school mark for career points with 108.

Again this season Vendegh and sophomore defender Trevor McEachron racked up numerous postseason awards. Vendegh was named the CAA Player of the Year for the second straight season and made his third appearance on the All-CAA first team and the All-South Atlantic Region team. McEachron earned a spot of the All-CAA first team for the first time after earning second-team honors last year. He also made the All-South Region team and joined Vendegh on the All-State first team.

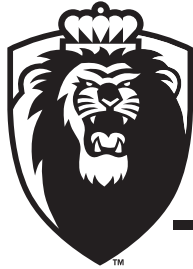

Colonial Athletic Association

Boasting a roster of 10 well-respected academic institutions, the Colonial Athletic Association continues to build on a proud history as one of the nation's top collegiate conferences.

With a geographic footprint that stretches from the shadow of the Statue of Liberty to the beaches of North Carolina, the landscape of the CAA is dotted with major metropolitan areas that include four of the nation's top 25 media markets – New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Washington, D.C. (8) and Baltimore (24).

The CAA showcases the athletic and academic skills of some of the nation's top student-athletes. On the playing field, the conference has produced 15 national team champions in four different sports, 28 individual national champions, 11 national coaches of the year and 10 national players of the year. In 2002-03, the conference sent two or more teams to the NCAA Tournament in seven different sports. The CAA has ranked as the top Division I non-football conference in the Sears Directors Cup standings in recent years.

Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars, 11 NCAA post-graduate scholars and 12 Honda Award winners. Last year, the CAA had 17 Verizon Academic All-Americans, including six who were selected to the first team. Nearly 1,000 CAA student-athletes posted at least a 3.2 grade point average while lettering in a varsity sport and received the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award in 2002-03.

The CAA conducts championships in 21 sports. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and volleyball.

In men's basketball, the CAA has earned a reputation as a "giant killer" in the NCAA Tournament. Since 1981, CAA schools have posted 12 wins over higher-seeded teams, including UNC Wilmington's upset of Southern California in 2002. Nine of the conference's 10 teams have made at least two NCAA Tournament appearances since 1990. In women's basketball, Old Dominion has captured three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and reached the title game again in 1997. In 2002, the Lady Monarchs advanced to the Elite Eight.

The conference has also excelled in many other sports. CAA squads have won 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981, which is not only more than any other conference but represents nearly half of all titles won. In baseball, the CAA has ranked as one of the nation's top five conferences in four of the past six seasons. The CAA is annually ranked among the nation's top 10 conferences in men's and women's soccer, and has traditionally sent multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament. The conference finished the 2002-03 campaign with teams ranked among the top

25 nationally in cross country, field hockey, men's soccer, wrestling, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's lacrosse. CAA member institutions are also committed to excellence in the classroom. The Colonial Academic Alliance was created in 2002 by the league's presidents with a goal of expanding their partnership to all aspects of university life outside of intercollegiate athletics. Among the programs already established is granting visiting academic status to student-athletes traveling to an away contest so that they have access to libraries, academic resource centers and computer labs.

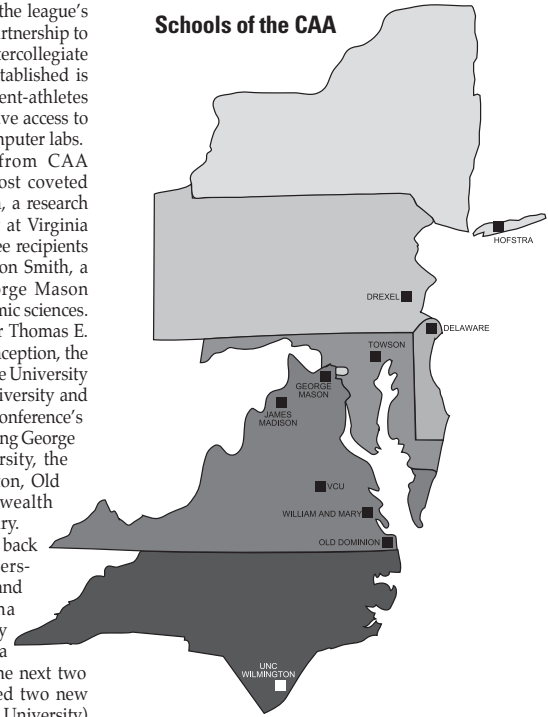
In 2002, two faculty members from CAA institutions were awarded academia's most coveted distinction – the Nobel Prize. John B. Fenn, a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Virginia Commonwealth University was one of three recipients of the Nobel Prize in chemistry, and Vernon Smith, a professor of economics and law at George Mason University, shared the Nobel Prize in economic sciences.

Under the direction of Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager, who has guided the CAA since its inception, the league recently expanded to 10 members. The University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University were introduced as the conference's newest members on December 13, 2000, joining George Mason University, James Madison University, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, Old Dominion University, Virginia Commonwealth University and the College of William & Mary.

The CAA traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members – George Mason, James Madison, and William and Mary – were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (UNC Wilmington and American University) and decided to form a new association. The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985. By the fall of 1986, the league gained automatic bids to NCAA Championships in men's basketball, soccer, baseball and women's basketball and formed an officials' bureau. Old Dominion became a member of the CAA in 1991-92 and Virginia Commonwealth University joined the conference prior to the 1995-96 season.

From all-star athletes to Nobel prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who stand out both on the playing field and in the classroom.
